

The Cypress City Council recently adopted a coyote management plan to address community concerns about the presence of coyotes in Cypress. While coyotes are generally reclusive animals who avoid human contact, it is important to be aware of their presence and take appropriate action to ensure the safety of your property and pets.

WHAT CAN I DO TO DISCOURAGE COYOTE ACTIVITY IN MY NEIGHBORHOOD?

Residents can take preventative measures to ensure they are not providing food or shelter sources that may attract coyotes and other wildlife to their neighborhoods. Here are some general tips:

- ➤ Never leave cats and small dogs outdoors unattended
- Always feed pets indoors
- Use enclosed bins for compost; never compost meat or fish
- Clean up spilled bird seed around feeders
- > Remove fallen fruit from the ground
- > Store trash cans in an area where they cannot be tipped over
- > Install motion-sensor lighting around your home
- Keep yards free of thick brush/weeds
- ➤ NEVER deliberately feed coyotes

HOW DO I REPORT COYOTES?

WHAT DO I DO WHEN I ENCOUNTER A COYOTE?

As part of the Coyote Management Plan, the City has developed the following list of recommended resident responses to coyote encounters:

WHAT IS HAZING AND HOW CAN IT HELP?

Hazing is a method used to move an animal out of an area or discourages an undesirable behavior or activity. Hazing can help maintain coyotes' fear of humans and deter them from frequenting your neighborhood. Hazing includes:

- ➤ Being LOUD AND LARGE yell and wave your arms
- Using noisemakers (e.g. whistles, air horns, etc)
- Using projectiles (e.g. sticks, small rocks, etc.)
- Other repellents (e.g. water hose, pepper spray, etc.)

If a coyote has not been hazed before, it might not immediately run away when you haze it. It's important to continue to haze the coyote until it leaves the area completely.

Share this information with family, friends, and neighbors! The more people that get involved in hazing, the more quickly you will see results.

HOW DO I PROTECT MY PETS?

The best way to minimize risk to pets is never to leave them outside unattended.

Confrontations between pets and coyotes are most likely to occur during breeding season (Jan-Mar) or pup season (Apr-Aug).

Consider making your yard safer for pets with a protective device installed on top of fencing, such as a "coyote roller", or provide them with a secure pet enclosure, such as a "catio".
